It was X-Mas morning, December 25th., 1934. We rolled into Tampa. Fla.

We had spent the night in Jacksonville, Fla., after driving from Charleston, S.C..

It was 1918 I graduated from high school, and with a scholarship, I started further education @ the College of Charleston. I am still an Alumni of the College of Charleston, class of 1922.

The reason for my trip to Tampa was the opening of my first leased shoe department in the specialty womens store of Ernest Mass.

I have said 'we' meaning me, my wife, three small boy children, and a maid.

From college I went into my fathers shoe business which was discontinued as he became incapacited, and I had learned of an opportunity to start out for myself. As a point of interest, my father started a shoe business in Charleston in 1893.

As stated above, I began my own career in Florida in 122 1934 in Tampa. Four years later I opened my second leased department in Jacksonville, in a womens fine retail operation, Purcells.

From there on, the style and plan of business operation was set, and many leased departments followed.

From leased departments I moved on to independent stores. First on Flanklin St. In Tampa, then Jacksonville, then StPetersburg, and finally in Sarasota. In all, there were 5 6 units in operation.
